Grade 1 Comprehension Worksheet

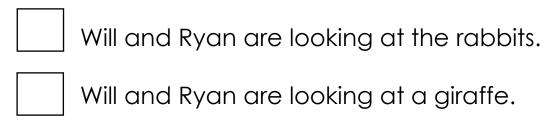


Drawing conclusions means figuring something out for yourself. To draw conclusions, you need to think about what makes the most sense.

Here are some examples of things you can figure out for yourself. Put an **X** in the box for the **conclusion** that makes the most sense.

1. One day, Will and Ryan went to the zoo with their mom! First, they watched the monkeys. The boys laughed while they did all kinds of silly things. Then they went to look at another animal. Ryan had never seen an animal that was so tall. Ryan thought that his neck was as tall as their house!

3.	Andy's favorite stuffed animal is Teddy the Teddy Bear. Andy likes to take Teddy with him everywhere he goes. On the night before the first day of first grade, Andy's mother told him to pack his backpack. He put in everything he needed for school, plus something else! This probably means that:
	Andy has Teddy in his backpack.
	Andy forgot to put his lunch in his backpack.
4.	The umpire yelled, "Strike three! You're out!" and Billy went back to the bench. He sat down next to his teammates and watched the next batter. The crowd cheered, and Billy heard the crack of the bat as someone hit the ball. Billy smiled as his friend ran to first base. He hoped their team would get a run.
